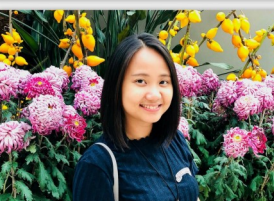

REAFFIRMED

Earlier this year, I stayed with a family living in a resettlement village in Taysan, Albay. The village was built and supported by ANCOP. The villagers are full of life and love in their very modest accommodation, despite the overcrowding, the looming threat of typhoons, and even of volcanic eruptions. In their village hopes and dreams are encouraged through faith and a renewed sense of optimism, that they have a chance for a brighter future. Spending time with them, I experienced how the help of charities like ANCOP can transform people's lives.

It is easy to feel detached from the plight of the poor especially for us living in the comfort of a first world country. The trip made me realise that these people are more than mere statistics. Everyone has their own story... stories of hardship, resilience, inspiration and happiness, that our help can really make a lasting, positive impact on them.

With this experience, I was inspired to accept the role of an ambassador.

The ambassador campaign reaffirmed to me the innate goodness of people. There were many people willing to help in whatever way they could. Some even approached me and suggested an idea for

a fundraiser or an idea to help the poor in other ways. Their enthusiasm revealed to me their charitable and selfless hearts. This reaffirmed my notion that people would always be there when an opportunity to help others is presented.

During the campaign, we had opportunities to spread awareness about our mission. We set up information stalls at the *Rise Conference* hosted by the Archdiocesan Office for the Youth, and at the University of Melbourne's *Night Market*. I was overjoyed with people volunteering to help out at these events. They brought awareness about our mission to people outside of the community. I realised that as an ambassador, part of my responsibility is to turn other people into advocates for ANCOP. I believe that people who accept the call to help ANCOP also become ambassadors.

I have been with the CFC community since joining Youth for Christ in 2008. My experiences have affirmed that our community practices what the church preaches, with CFC members extending helping hands to fulfil our mission for the poor. Whether it is time, treasure or talent, I am overjoyed by their willingness to serve our less fortunate brothers and sisters.

ANCOP has always been something that I’ve kept close to my heart since an immersion trip during a YFC - Oceania Great Adventure Tour four years ago in the Philippines. On the first day of our visit I remember waking up in my host family’s house and feeling a sense of warmth and joy being in their presence. The families living in the village had very little material things. Despite living a simple life their hospitality and the love that they shared with us was immense.

After the immersion trip I felt the urge to give some of my time to assist those who are less fortunate and that’s when I took on the role as team coordinator for Vinnies Sydney Night Patrol (Food Van) Services. I was inspired to take on the ANCOP Ambassador role because it allowed me to continue serving the poor by raising awareness about ANCOP’s mission to help continue their amazing work across the Philippines, Papua New Guinea and the Solomon Islands. When I was given the opportunity to take on the role I saw it as an opportunity to give back to families—just like the one who hosted me four years ago.

The campaign has taught me that there can never be enough kindness and love in this world. In today’s society we often wake up reading news about terrible events that have occurred around the world and this campaign showed me that people can still be kind to each other. Even the smallest of things that are done with great love can have an incredible impact on others.

The ambassador role has allowed me to go a little bit out of my comfort zone in order to spread the mission and vision of ANCOP. I am grateful for the opportunity to encourage others to give their time to help people restore their dignity by overcoming

poverty. It has also reminded me of the power of a community like ours who are willing to rally together for a worthy cause. The CFC Community is filled with dedicated and charitable individuals and this is definitely something I witnessed and encountered in the SFC Ministry. affects their ability to feel a sense of worth and dignity in society. This program has inspired me to really look into how I can help individuals and families’ living situations in order to help them feel safer in participating in family and community life.

Saint Teresa is one of my favourite saints and she once said “Let us not make a mistake - that the hunger is only for a piece of bread. The hunger of today is so much greater: for love - to be wanted, to be loved, to be cared for, to be somebody” and through ANCOP’s mission we can do something about this. CFC is an incredible community filled with kind, loving and generous people. It made me feel blessed to be part of a community that shares Christ’s love with the poor. The events and money raised would not have happened if it were not for the team and supporters that assisted me along the way. The events required a lot of effort and time and I owe it to the amazing people who assisted me and kept ANCOP in their prayers— the SFC ANCOP team, area leaders, coordinators, families, friends and generous donors. I just migrated to Melbourne by myself last year, have no family or close friends to begin with, and am still trying to establish myself in this new-found home. When I was asked to be an ANCOP ambassador, I didn't hesitate to say yes – even though I'm just new – because I felt that God is calling me to do so. Back when I was in Singapore serving in SFC, I had the opportunity to go on mission in the Philippines for ANCOP and immersed myself in the work of ANCOP. It was truly a humbling experience and the memories linger on up to now. I believe that ANCOP is God's vehicle to reach out to the poor and that inspires me to allow myself to be used and be empowered by God as an ambassador.

One of the highlights of my campaign was the movie fundraising. Liaising with the cinema, posting digital ads and inviting everyone to attend the event can be draining and a daunting task, but the help of CFC leaders in my area lightened the load. Tickets were sold out three days before the event and it felt great to see heaps of familiar faces at the event to show their support. What a satisfying moment it was knowing that all the effort and hard work were worth it.

From this experience and my other campaign activities, I've learned that people from all walks of life have the capacity to love and share what they can. We just have to spread the awareness of ANCOP's mission and let people know how they can help. I've also realised during this campaign that people who most succeed in life are the ones who genuinely practice humility.

The ambassador role has taught me that I can't be a real servant if I don't have a humble heart. There were times when I thought that I don't deserve this role but I've learned to acknowledge my imperfections, listen to my mentors and

The ANCOP Ambassador has been a rewarding experience for me and I would like to thank God for this wonderful opportunity. To all those who in one way or another contributed to the campaign, may God continue to bless you and your families for your generosity. A special mention to Chito and Mylene Sarmiento, my ANCOP coordinators. They were always there to help and inspire me. I also would like to thank Lorie and Nanette Estera, my mentors who gave valuable advice, and pulled me up whenever I fell. Truly, they are angels sent from heaven. I also would like to thank my lovely wife — she is my rock, my light, and my avid supporter. She was a tremendous help in soliciting pledges!

May the work we do transform the lives of those who need it most and may they feel God's love and compassion. Let us pray for all the people and volunteers involved in ANCOP that they may continue to do this work for the glory of God almighty. Please continue to give generously to ANCOP.



When I was shown the work of ANCOP and asked to be the Ambassador, I could not turn my gaze elsewhere. I said Yes without hesitation. Feeling really humbled, I remembered what Pope Francis said, that “in all circumstances, all Christians should listen to the cry of the poor”. I felt that this was my call to action. It has always been part of my daily prayer to ask God to show me my purpose, so I feel this is His answer to that prayer.

Being the Ambassador, I have learned to look at poverty for what it really is. We were in Manila earlier this year and I had a clearer view of the social landscape— seen with a fresh set of eyes. This has strengthened my resolve to do something; to be an agent of change, to be a channel of God’s blessings. Having this in mind and heart, giving becomes easier, and ‘asking or begging’ on behalf of the least becomes less uncomfortable.

As the ambassador, I believe I have been able to influence others to follow suit. This is shown in the increase in the number of Handmaids making a commitment to support ANCOP. They really inspired me a lot. During the household visits, I got the chance to know my sisters better and understand their individual circumstances. While some have full time jobs and partners, most of them are on their own, facing their own adversities and fighting their own battles. In them, I saw the power of the human spirit. With a little inspiration and encouragement, they have been able to tap into their creative space to translate their time, talent and treasure into something so tangible, which enables them to be of help to others. I realised that the Handmaids are very enterprising!

The Handmaids and I had a lot of joyful times during the campaign. The silent “Market Market” was fun! We were selling all sorts of things through Facebook Messenger. Including macaroons! The “Autumnfest” was a joyful occasion where we gathered and had fun – without even thinking of how much we are supposed to raise. BEING AN ANCOP ambassador has been nothing but a transforming experience. It meant being able to share Christ's transforming love with the poor, and in doing so we ourselves are transformed.

I first said yes to running for the ANCOP ambassadorship in early 2016, right after experiencing CFC Youth for Christ's Great Adventure Tour in the Philippines. The GAT involved spending a few days in the ANCOP-sponsored schools and villages. Inspired by what I had witnessed during GAT, I said yes to continuing to be a witness for the work of ANCOP.

The ANCOP ambassador campaign lasts for roughly three months, which flew by with countless household presentations and fundraising activities. The campaigning ended on the Proclamation Night in Sydney in May. The ANCOP Immersion Tour occurred in 2017, wherein we ambassadors spent a couple of weeks in the Philippines visiting the volunteers and beneficiaries of ANCOP.

As an advocate for literacy and the right to education, spending time with the Cornerstone and ESP-supported students was a joyful experience for me. Hearing the testimonies from the ANCOP scholars firsthand truly made me appreciate ANCOP's role in building hope through education, and the role of education in lifting the future of the student, the family, and the greater community.

We also spent some time in the ANCOP villages, particularly villages that were built after Typhoon Yolanda. Hearing true stories from survivors and witnessing their resilience and gratefulness reminded me of God's faithfulness through the toughest of times.

I was also inspired by the generous service of the ANCOP volunteers in the Philippines. They made us all feel welcomed and part of the bigger ANCOP international family. Two years after, I find myself in the reality of the "once an ambassador, always an ambassador" lifestyle. Long after the campaign and the immersion, the mission continues. God continues to shower us with His grace through new avenues and continues to grant us the grace to keep on saying yes to the mission. I found myself, along with the ANCOP Victoria team, exploring new opportunities to spread the word about ANCOP's mission. This includes forging new partnerships with businesses and other associations. I can only be grateful with every transformative encounter with Christ that I have experienced and continue to experience through ANCOP.

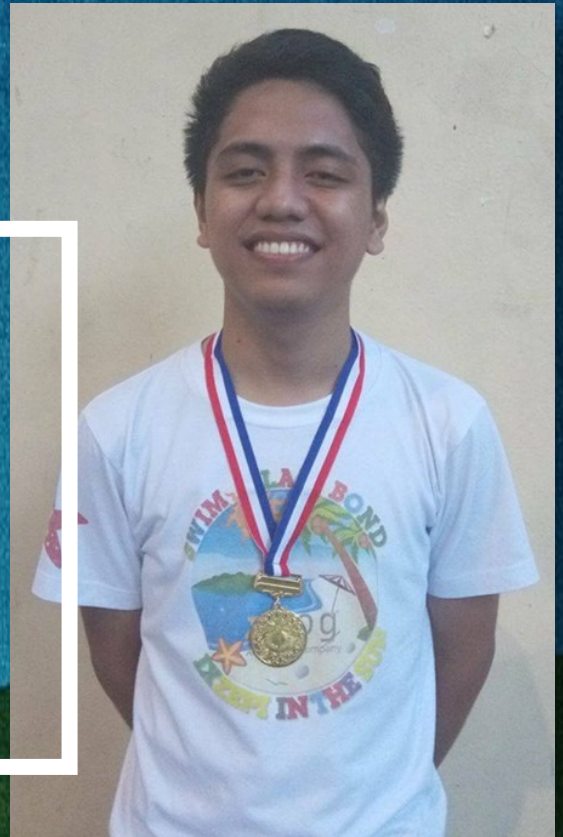


COMPANIONS ON THE JOURNEY

My family need to work hard to survive each day. So, I committed myself to do everything to uplift my family from this misery. At a very young age I learned to do things to earn a living—sold street food after school, took a sideline job in a rubber factory, prepared rice treats at night to sell the next day, tutored, etc. I studied hard and never lost sight of my goals. Despite graduating Salutatorian in primary school and Valedictorian in high school, I had serious doubts about continuing to university. I knew my family would not be able to afford the costs.

George has been an ANCOP Australia scholar for four years now. He has five siblings. His father is a plumber and his mother is a vendor in a poor Manila district. He finishes next year.



Still, I enrolled in university despite the financial difficulty. There were times when I failed to comply with the payment requirements. I didn’t mind all the hardship and just focused on my studies. I held on to my belief that God would never leave me. Out of nowhere, someone called and asked me for an interview. I didn’t know what for. Someone told me later that my high school teachers filed an ANCOP scholarship application on my behalf. After going through the process, I officially became an ANCOP scholar and that was one of the best things that

happened to me. ANCOP helps me finance my school expenses, which lessens the burden on me and my family. Aside from monetary assistance, ANCOP also helps me with value formation, and uplifts my personal and spiritual well-being. I became friends with other ANCOP scholars. I gained Titos and Titas in Couples for Christ. They became my second parents who guide and support me, and above all, have helped me strengthen my bond with God.

Being an Accountancy student is really hard; it is not just an academic challenge but also a test of perseverance and endurance. I know that I can’t afford to fail for the sake of my dreams and the hopes of the people believing and supporting me. I can tell you gladly that I am a consistent Dean’s lister since first year uni. I also bagged first place in the recently concluded Accounting Quiz Bee in our school. This coming school year (2018-19) will be my last year in university. I am hopeful to graduate with flying colours and to work in my chosen field. For these, I am so grateful to all the people who are with me in my journey.

Taking the Road Less Traveled

A Volunteer's Story

"I figured out why I accepted the ANCOP volunteer role. I said to myself, 'What I do for the ANCOP scholars are things I wasn't able to do for my kids.'"

I'm Ed Naco, 56 years old, a volunteer of the ANCOP Education Sponsorship Program Project Implementation Team (PIT) in San Mateo, Rizal. I'm married to Leony.

I used to be a tricycle, jeep, and "FX" (utility vehicle) driver. I wasn't able to make it past high school because I came from a poor family. Luckily, I was able to work abroad for a year as an electrician in Iraq.

MY KIDS

Leony and I have three children. Two of them are in Japan. One is working as an English teacher, the other as a chef. My youngest has been working as a programmer for more than two years now. They all help us augment our income from our small *sari-sari store*.

My eldest son, the chef, took up Information Technology (IT) but then went

to Japan to study Nihongo. When he was already proficient in the language, he worked at a restaurant where he was eventually promoted as a chef. He now has a working visa.

My daughter, the English teacher, is also a Computer Science cum laude graduate but she is adventurous. She patiently looked for a job in Japan through the internet. She was interviewed online and eventually was invited to go to Japan. She can't even speak their language. She just speaks English, and I'm very happy because she got the job. She's now teaching primary students and also adults who want to learn English on the side. She got married in 2016 to a fellow English teacher from Nepal.

AS A FATHER

I admit that I am not a perfect father.

When my kids were small, I wasn't able to fully support them. When their teacher requested for a meeting with the parents, I did not attend. I just focused on earning a living for the family. I left the parenting responsibilities to my wife. I only went to their school during graduation or when they received awards. My kids always received awards, my daughter was even a valedictorian when she graduated. When my kids had school projects, I did not help them.

START OF THE ANCOP JOURNEY

We joined Couples for Christ (CFC) in 1996. We served as KFC Coordinators for seven years until we had to ease out of service due to a serious problem at that time. In 2012, our chapter head approached us to do an ANCOP volunteer work. I said, "*Bro, I may not be fit for that*

role. What is ANCOP anyway?"

Later, I figured out why I accepted the ANCOP volunteer role. I said to myself, "What I do for the ANCOP scholars are things I wasn't able to do for my kids."

ANCOP RESPONSIBILITIES

When my wife and I accepted the ANCOP volunteer opportunity, I started doing things I had not been able to do for my own kids.

One of these things is going to the scholar's school when they have academic problems, such as if they have a failing grade. I talk to the teacher or the principal. I don't want their scholarship to go to waste.

Sometimes, I'm shy to post my pictures with the scholars on Facebook when we buy their school supplies, shoes, and other materials they need because I wasn't able to do this for my own kids. I worry that if my kids see the photos, they might say, "Daddy didn't do this for us. How come he's doing it for other kids who are not even related to him?"

We also experience having problematic kids. Sometimes, I bring home this load on my shoulders. I get to share it with my wife, Leony. This is why I always like Leony to be with me because we share the responsibility of looking after the ANCOP scholars. It seems like we suddenly have a bunch of kids!

When the scholars' benefits are released to us, Leony and I immediately deliver them to the scholars. We do it fast. If we receive the

benefits in the morning, we have to hand it over to the scholars by afternoon. If we receive it at noon time, we must give it by evening. We don't delay the release of funds. We know that the scholars badly need it. It may affect their class attendance the next day if, say, they don't have any more money for transportation.

When my wife and I leave the house, we close down our *sari-sari store*. So, if we are out in the field doing ANCOP volunteer work the whole day, the store is also closed the whole day.

SUPPORT GIVEN TO ANCOP SCHOLARS

Aside from the financial support given by ANCOP, the PIT members are there to care for the scholars. We treat them like our own children. We give our full support in their academic and personal lives. We constantly encourage them to press on with their studies and advise their parents to help and guide their kids too.

There are scholars who do not excel academically but are determined to study. Poverty and its consequential problems often weigh down their performance in school. This is why I walk the extra mile to reach out to their class adviser or principal to give the scholar a chance to meet ANCOP's grade requirements.

MY MOTIVATION

We feel great joy when we see scholars who take their studies seriously. We also feel sad when there are scholars who

sometimes get failing grades.

ANCOP has changed me a lot in many ways since Leony and I joined the organization in 2012.

We were able to reach places we had never thought we'd even visit, and we get to talk to strangers who've now become our associates.

I can't explain the transformation that happened to me, which is similar to the transformation of St. Paul. I used to be a quiet person who wouldn't even bother to

talk to strangers. But suddenly, I am now confident and courageous in talking to anyone, whatever their status in life.

When we visited isolated areas in Barangay Banaba to evangelize for the Christian Life Program, we were exposed to destitute families who were deprived of the comforts of life.

As we visited households, we learned their colorful life stories. It brought back memories of my family's life when we were still drowning in poverty and seemingly hopeless. But hearing the stories of families in these households, I realised my problems are not as big as theirs. There were times when I had to get out of the house while talking to these families because I couldn't hold back my tears anymore.

This made me commit to help at least one of their kids to finish school so they can escape poverty. To see former street kids graduate from school is such a beautiful experience for us. It inspires us to continue our volunteer work for ANCOP. And for the parents, we know it's tough. But as parents who weren't able to finish our own studies and who went through difficult life challenges but didn't give up for the sake of our own children's future, we share to the scholars' parents that if we were able to do it, they can too!

LIVELIHOOD THROUGH EDUCATION

According to a report by the World Health Organization, Papua New Guinea is one of the most dangerous places in the world to be a woman (Putupai 2016). Women are often disadvantaged for a range of cultural, financial and educational reasons. Recognising this, the Couples for Christ elders in PNG, through ANCOP, offered some help. Last year, CFC ANCOP Australia was able to sponsor the participation of eight women in a short-term vocational course on dressmaking. Even before completing the course, they already had offers to sew school uniforms. But having the skills alone is not enough. The next hurdle was to have sewing machines and a place to set up their shop. Holding tight on the opportunity, CFC PNG were quick to mobilise communications and logistics. With the help of CFC ANCOP Australia, donations for sewing machines quickly came in. Delma Dumas, a member of the CFC Handmaids of the Lord, generously offered her garage as a place to set up shop. Late last year, they also had an offer to sew bags for a cement factory. This was a very empowering change for these women. Below are messages of gratitude from some of them.

I have no experience in sewing but was thankful to the CFC ANCOP Scholarship which sent me to St. Therese Vocational School. I learnt Garmenting for three months. After graduating, I was given an opportunity to continue my sewing skills at sister Delma Duma's workshop. I normally sew 10 to 20 blouses per week and earn almost K100 to K200 per week. This way, I am able to help my husband with our children's school needs. In the next two to five years I hope to set up a sewing workshop of my own and also assist other sisters.

Hello! I am **Anita Gidam**. I would like to thank ANCOP Australia for your generosity in sponsoring me. I now sew meri blouses and earn money to sustain my family of five. I am an ex-teacher without any source of income and now I am really experiencing God's wonderful love, shared with my sisters who are also ANCOP beneficiaries. Just saying thank you is not enough, I don't know what to do, only God knows my heart.

My name is **Louise Kenny**. I am 37 years old, married with two kids.

I was blessed to be chosen to attend the sewing course. After the training, we were so blessed to have sister Delma's workshop so that we can sew on our own. I sew about five to 10 blouses a week and I sell them at K15 or K20 just to help my kids with lunch money and our expenses for the house. It helps us a lot. I sometimes cry if I don't have anything to sew but I am so thankful that I can earn something on my own. I am hoping to become a teacher. I want to teach my dear sisters how to sew so they can earn money too. I gain confidence in myself and know that through God everything is possible.

Hi! My name is **Lynette**. Being a single mum without a job is really a big struggle. Learning the skill of sewing is a really big experience in my life, a big change from all the obstacles I've been through. I am really blessed. I can sew 15 to 20 blouses a week and earn every day. I do the sales in front of my house. I buy a packet of rice or protein every day and save for my daughter's lunch money every day, which is something I had never done in the past. Thank you for sharing. God bless you.

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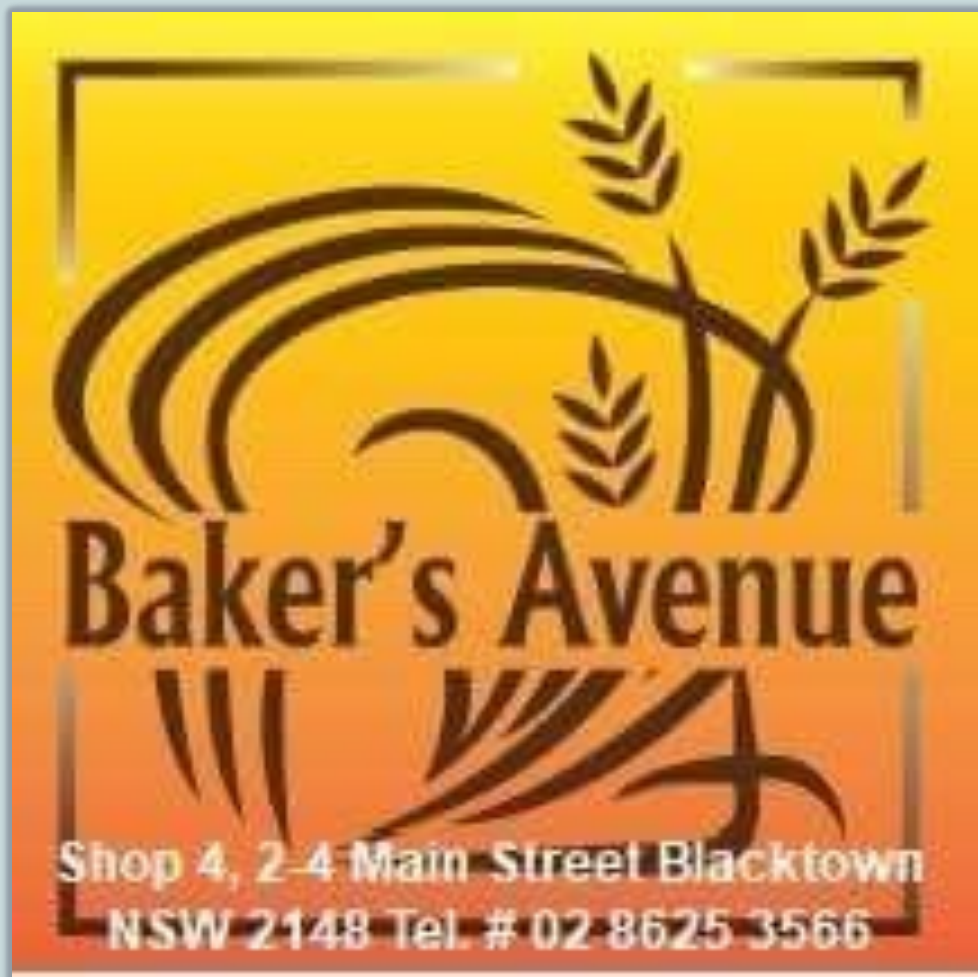
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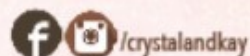
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
